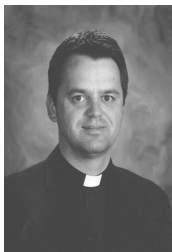

In the gospel for this Sunday we hear about Peter and Andrew, James and John who heard the call of the Lord, dropped everything and followed Him. They were not the sort of people anyone would suspect of being religious. They were not the sort of people anyone would suspect could convince others to change their lives. They were not the sort of people that anyone would suspect could take the position of leadership in the conversion of the world. They were common, everyday people, fishermen. But they were called. They responded. And as we know God worked his wonders through them.

No one should feel discouraged from being a priest or a sister for that matter because he or she does not feel worthy enough. Who is? And no one should be deprived of the opportunity to become a priest, or a sister for that matter, because relatives want something else for them. To discourage a vocation is to discourage a person from entering into the greatest life in the world. So this Sunday's readings should lead us to a reflection on the vocation to the priesthood and religious life. I wish I could find a way to communicate to you, and particularly to our young people, my feelings about the priesthood. It is a gift, and also a great vocation. This Sunday we pray for vocations to the priesthood and religious life. May more and more of our young men and women receive the call. May they listen to the call. May they follow, and, may they allow the Spirit to work through them. You all know how much we need priests and religious especially in this part of the world.

As many of you know we had a nice party for New Year's Eve that was organized by our Polish community. It was a good time to welcome in a New Year. I am very grateful to those who helped to make this event so special. About 130 people came and we even made some money that will go into our parish budget. So, thank you once again to those who put their time and effort to decorate and organize this event but also to those who came. I am looking forward to more events like this in the future. Also as you can see we are renting out our Parish Center to other private events. This place has become quite popular and that is good, because it brings some income to our parish. During the Lenten season, however, we are not allowing any parties at the gym.

Please say a prayer for Fr. Tom McQuaid whose birthday was last Monday, January 16 and also for Monsignor John Canary who has his birthday on January 22. I am personally thankful for their presence here at St. Richard but also for their vocation and for being good examples of priestly ministry. Have a great week.

W Ewangelii na tą niedzielę słyszymy jak Pan Jezus powołuje pierwszych apostołów. Piotr i Andrzej zarzucali swoje sieci dzień w dzień i w niejedną noc, ale niewiele z tego mieli korzyści. W tym krótkim epizodzie rybackim, widzimy jak wspaniały jest Bóg w Jezusie Chrystusie! Odkrył przed tymi braćmi nowy wymiar życia, pomógł im zobaczyć coś nieskończenie piękniejszego niż wodorosty, płetwy ryb, sznury sieci i słony pot. YOUR DEACON DAYDREAMS!

"Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world." This is a bold statement. Stop and reflect on all of our own personal sins then multiply them by all the sins in the whole universe, so that our loving God sent His only Son to become the sacrificial lamb as our Savior. Sacrificing a lamb goes way back to the ancient Passover feast offered up to remove all the guilt for all the wrongdoings committed. Each time we receive the Holy Eucharist, the Sacred Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of our Lord, we pray to the Lamb of God to take away our sins. Do these words simply roll off our tongues automatically without any thought of what we are asking?

As long as we are talking about how and why we pray, winter is a great time to take an inventory of so many things, like how much stuff that we have that is overtaking our lives. Perhaps if we toss some of it or donate it, not only would we have more space but someone else could make better use of it. Maybe it's been some time since we went for a physical exam at the doc? Hopefully, by now we are eating more sensibly since the holiday feasts are over? Maybe we made a resolution to prepare a bucket list of things we wanted to do but have put off for a long time, like read that book, or make some time to read the Christmas letters you got in your cards or telephoned someone you haven't talked to for some time. Today is just as good a day to dust off your bible and to take time to read it. When was the last time you took an inventory of your prayer life? St. Padre Pio said: "*Those who pray, have hope. Those who pray little, are in great danger. Those who do not pray, are lost.*" Is Jesus on your speed dial? When was the last time you had a heart-to-heart with our Creator? Not long along, the game show Jeopardy category was "Religion." The lady who responded, "Who was the Holy Spirit?" won ten grand! Are morning and evening prayers a part of your daily schedule or don't you give them a second thought? There are so many things we can pray, like a rosary, a novena, the chaplet of Divine Mercy, a litany, or even the many beautiful prayers that are part of our missalettes in church, like the Anima Christi prayer or the Prayer to St. Michael or the Memorare. Are you listening regularly or have tried at least once the Catholic Relevant radio station 950 AM or online or its app? We also have a whole cable station EWTN chock full of great programs too to help us with our spiritual life. Relevant Radio will pause at 6AM, Noon and 6 PM to say the Angelus prayer, we can too. The ordained and religious of the church will recite the Divine Office, aka the Liturgy of the Hours too. Plus, the best prayer, is "Lord, help me." Every once in a while, when I do a funeral committal, I will see someone's favorite prayer tucked into their coffin and you can tell by the ragged edges or the folds or tape on it, that particular person had an active prayer life. And I've said it before, but it's worth repeating, "A family that prays together, stays together." God hears and answers all prayers, in His own time and sometimes the answer is "No." But however, you choose to pray, start today. He's on call 24/7. Get comfortable and tell the Lord what's on your mind, good or bad, happy or sad, He wants to hear from His children. Pray this week for those who will be marching for life in Washington DC. 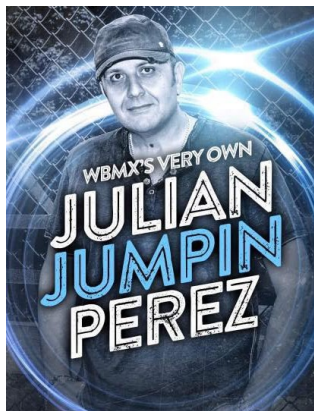

INFANT BAPTISMS

All arrangements should be made at least one month in advance by calling the Parish Office. Baptisms take place normally on the 1st (English) & 2nd (Polish) Sunday of the month. In preparation for the child's baptism, parents must attend a mandatory Parent Preparation Session which both parents must attend. These preparation sessions are held once a month.

WEDDINGS

Weddings are celebrated at 1:00PM and 2:30PM on Saturday afternoons. No arrangements should be made before first meeting with the parish priest. Arrangements should be made by calling the Parish Office for an appointment with one of the priests. According to Archdiocesan policy, arrangements begin at least six months in advance.

COMMUNION FOR THE SICK AND HOMEBOUND

We ask that you please help us remain informed about parishioners who are hospitalized, homebound or in a nursing home.

Our Ministers of Care will gladly bring Communion to anyone who is sick or homebound at a time that is convenient for you. If you would like to receive Communion at home, please call the Parish Office to make the necessary arrangements.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION PROGRAM/C.C.D.
